
The Representation Journey



Older Australians have been granted a trio of cost-of-living measures in the recent Federal Budget, all of which were championed by National Seniors. The Policy team looks at what other benefits are available to you.

The 2024/25 Federal Budget has addressed the needs of older Australians w cost-of-living measures.

The Budget includes a trio of significant changes that benefit seniors—anot rebate, an increase in Commonwealth Rent Assistance, and an extension of deeming rates.

We welcomed these changes, which were part of our pre-budget recommen


Continued freeze on deeming rates

With the RBA having raised interest rates, pensioners subject to deeming w in the announcement of an ongoing freeze on social security deeming rates.

The Budget extends the freeze on deeming rates for an additional 12 month them at their current levels until 30 June 2025.

This follows the initial two-year freeze set to end on 30 June 2024. The lowe 0.25%, and 2.25% for the upper rate.

Given various predictions about future interest rate changes, National Seniors welcomed this degree of certainty for pensioners with deemed assets.



The 12 month freeze on deeming rates until 30

June 2025 ensured pension payments did not reduce as inflation rises.

This extended the initial two-year freeze that was ending on 30 June 2024.



Commonwealth Rent Assistance

In a move welcomed by National Seniors, the government will increase the maximum rate Commonwealth Rent Assistance (CRA) by 10% from 20 September 2024.

This follows on from a 15% increase in the maximum rate in last year' sudget. For a single renter receiving the maximum rate, CRA will increase by \$16.50 per fortright, also to \$5 over a year.

In our pre-budget submission, National Seniors recommend an increase in the CRA due rising rents and the overall cost of living.

The increase in the **Commonwealth Rent Assistance** helped 534,000 people aged 50+ receiving Commonwealth Rent Assistance.

A single renter receiving the maximum payment received an **extra \$18.82 per fortnight**, almost \$500 in a year.

Our consistent, frequent and balanced media approach, ensured our advocacy message remained loud and clear.

















National Seniors Australia was mentioned in the media **2,640** times, with our stories being viewed **66.5 million** times.
