Using the above format, enter these suburbs:

Balcatta - Group of three shops on Erindale Rd, also Salvos, at 207 Balcatta Rd, Balcatta.

Odin Tavern, corner of Erindale Rd and Delawney St, opens at 11am for coffee and food.

Scarborough - Group of four smaller shops on Scarborough Beach Rd, near intersection with Gildercliffe St. Parking at rear and two cafes.

Osborne Park – Two large shops at 320 Selby St, parking at rear. Also, Vinnies 443 Scarborough Beach Road.

Shenton Park - ParaQuad, Orton Rd. Large op shop, also selling furniture. Book Bazaar, a huge adjacent building. Receives 'discards' from the State Libraries, along with donations.

Cannington - Intersection of Kent St and Albany Highway. Group of five large shops. Coffee at Yolanda's Catering, Unit 9, 1296 Albany Highway.

Council Refuse Tips often include an op shop with large items outside:

Balcatta Reuse Shop, 238 Balcatta Rd, Balcatta, adjacent to the refuse station.

Tamala Park Reuse Shop, 1700 Marmion Ave, Mindarie.

NSA NATIONAL "KEEP CASH" CAMPAIGN

National Seniors Australia (NSA) has welcomed news that the Federal Government will mandate that big businesses selling essential items, such as groceries and fuel, must accept cash.

Announced by the Treasurer, Jim Chalmers, this week, the proposal is set to be implemented from 1 January 2026, subject to consultation.

The news comes six months after NSA, which is the peak consumer body for older Australians, launched its Keep Cash (accessible and accepted) campaign to help those impacted by the move towards a cashless society.

NSA chief executive officer, Chris Grice, said the announcement will be warmly welcomed by the thousands of older Australians, and others, who regularly use cash.
